



Penile implant discussion guide

If you're considering a penile implant to treat erectile dysfunction (ED), it's important to understand the potential benefits and risks. This guide can help you start an open and candid conversation with your physician.

Self-reflection

When you meet with your physician, they'll ask you questions about your journey so far. To be prepared for the conversation, take a moment to reflect on the following:

How long have I experienced ED symptoms? (ex.: trouble getting and keeping an erection, reduced sex drive)	What treatments have I tried and was I happy with them?
What made me decide to seek treatment for ED? (ex.: masturbation, sex with partner, ability to date, affordable, discreet option, spontaneity, etc.)	What are my hesitations when considering an implant? (ex.: I feel my symptoms aren't that bad, I'm scared of surgery, I'm not sure if I can afford it)

	What will my penis look like after surgery?
	Will there be a change in the length or girth of my penis?
	Can I still have a natural erection if I have the implant? Or if I have the implant removed?
	Would I still use other treatments like pills and injections?

	If I have questions about my penile implant, who do I call?
